### *From The President:*

## **Consider Adopting a “ShyHound”**

With winter finally arriving in Western New York, I hope all of you and your families (human, canine, feline and otherwise) are finding ways to stay warm and dry. And I hope you all had a very happy holiday season!

We had a happy Christmas with family and friends at the Doxey household. Along with the other dogs and cats, my two-year old brindle, Padre, seemed to enjoy his first Christmas in a real home, and I’m happy to say that, despite being just two, he never once touched any of the Christmas trees.

Even more important, Padre was really quite social when guests came to visit and when I took him to visit family. For many greys, socializing is second nature and a lot of fun, but Padre hasn’t always been one of those hounds. He is, by nature, very shy, and seeing him warm up to strangers and enjoy the holidays was very heartwarming.

Padre came to me last spring as a foster. We always try not to “label” new dogs as “shy” or “spooky,” yet there is an occasional newcomer who is very timid around people - particularly men and young children. It might be that they were mistreated, but not always. Sometimes it’s just their temperament. Very shy dogs can be a challenge to place in homes. It can take days for them to establish enough trust to take a treat from their owners’ or foster parents’ hands, and much longer for them to feel safe among strangers. (Padre, for example, wouldn’t come in for two hours on a cold day last March because scary men were here installing my home theatre system ...) Shy dogs need extra work and patience before their inner sweetness begins to emerge. Some might even become aggressive when they feel threatened. More likely, they will flee or freeze.

It takes a particular kind of “parent” to work with a shy dog, but having now adopted two, I can say that there is nothing much more rewarding than watching them emerge from their shells. Padre is not yet ready for a Meet & Greet, nor even to take a treat from the hand of some men (unless it’s real meat!) but he has come a long way from the young foster who cowered away from even the safe and loving people at his first vet appointment. He is now a fun and silly two-year old, who follows me everywhere, gives kisses, greets visitors at the door and is much more brave than his outgoing older siblings on slippery floors and stairs.

So, I encourage those with the time and patience to consider making room in their lives for a “shy” greyhound. He or she can blossom into a sweet, devoted and really quite fun companion - and I think deep inside, will be forever greytful.

# Make Sure Your Greyhound's Collar is Safe

Please don't assume that putting a safety collar on your greyhound automatically makes your dog safe from escape. Any collar, regardless of style, is only as good as its adjustment.

Consider the design of the safety collar (also referred to as humane choke or a martingale choke). It's a two piece collar — a solid loop to which you attach the leash and an adjustable choke to which the closed martingale loop attaches through two metal rectangular pieces.

Simply stated, if you adjust the collar by fitting it up high on your greyhound's neck (behind his ears) and the two metal rectangles readily touch, you're very apt to lose your shy dog in the next parade! The photo on the right shows Nikki's collar improperly adjusted.

To fit properly, the metal pieces must be closer to an inch apart when you've pulled really tightly on that martingale loop. The photo on the left illustrates Nikki's properly-adjusted collar. Check the collar fit from time to time. They do stretch over



time and need to be re-fitted.

Remember: Greyhounds jump backwards when they're frightened. Pull down on the leash for extra insurance if you see your dog getting frightened. They can back right out of an incorrectly adjusted collar and you will be left holding a leash with no dog attached if you don't pull down on the leash.

A final to do: Attach your dog's tags on any place other than the large D-ring. The D-ring is meant for the leash snap only. Tags attached to the D-ring can catch on hooks, knobs, and the like and have been known to cause strangulation. We strongly urge using a non-Martingale collar for tags; save the Martingale collars for leash walks only. The tag loop can get caught on knobs, crates, fences and other objects even if no tags are on the loop.

He is very gentle in taking a treat from your hand. Even on a visit to Pet Supplies, he was right there next to the open bins of bulk dog treats but never stole a thing! How proud I was of him, even though he's not my dog.

Anyone who adopts “Mr. Z” will find themselves blessed with a loving, grateful companion. And the quality of the time you have together will be priceless.
